

# THE SNOW, THE COLD

December is a month of transformation for me. January too. They mean snow. They mean cold. They signify the incipience of the ending of the circle that is a year. Again, we have ridden the circumference of its course. I try to measure what the accumulation of events in the context of a year mean, what they stand for and constitute and the scale breaks, the ruler snaps.

Last January (2011), I was sitting in Buckeye Donuts in Columbus, Ohio and overheard a man tell another man that he wasn't sure if he was going to make it through the winter. Both men had conventional winter hats on and were blowing breath into hands recently relinquished of their gloves. The man who was listening at first assured the man who was speaking first that, indeed, they would make it through the winter—with some beer and football and a little getting-together, yes—they would make it through. For whatever reason, his

words stayed with me that day. Out of every conversation you overhear, most get sent to (what I like to believe is) the equivalent of a trashcan on a computer—recoverable, but (probably, eventually, inevitably) forgotten. Not like *yeah*, *man*, we got it bad. Winter... And not that I find savior-like warmth in beer and football. Far from it. But there is something to be said about the snow, the

We cold-snow-blessed Midwesterners of a certain latitude get something that those non-snow-cold-blessed don't. An endurance. A promise. Some combination of sadness/fatalism amalgamated with joy/carefully-calculated will. We have to get through something. There are distinct obstacles to our days. We use moments of time to tie a scarf, shovel a sidewalk, pull on gloves, or blow breath in our hands—moments that we might otherwise use doing other things. We take time. That's what December directs me to reflect on. Time. We slow down. What we assume about traveling through our days gets deconstructed. We follow our breath and feel warmth so much more fully.

In our hibernation of sorts we have

dreams that tell us who we will be when it's time to wake up. And we do wake up—in March or April or May—changed inexorably, punctuated by the seasons of the

Meet Morgan, a new Boxcar Collective Mem-



### **BOOK REVIEW**

*The Spell of the Sensuous* by David Abram

I have a good friend, let's call him Ted. Ted spent a good deal of time working on Natural Building projects in Utah to learn techniques and materials appropriate for the best construction, insulation, and harmony with a given DAVID ABRAM



space's natural geography. This practice of re-imaging our human relationship to the natural world led my friend towards a dire need to understand the natural world, first and foremost through understanding our relationship to animals.

In our culture today, human relationships with animals are mostly spoken about by ethical vegetarianism or veganism, and often by animal liberation activists and earth liberation activists. What I find striking about Abram's work is that the ultimate goal, in Abram's mind, is to observe animals and our innate connection to them with a fine tooth comb. Abram brings in accounts of his time in Indonesia studying magic, which spirals into a full-blown, accidental investigation into the spirituality of animals, and ultimately, a love song of observations of animal behaviors and patterns. The book takes on a subject matter that challenges the readers' concept of humanity, while simultaneously teaching the reader humility through observation of those animals and beings that have lived long before civilization. Abram's thoughts revolve around indigenous world communities, groups such as the Great Plains Native Americans, Australian cultures, and Asian cultures.

I highly suggest this manual for its careful and artistic preservation of how spirituality functions in cultures which are based on earth religions, but also as a call to the modern American reader who may feel a deep longing to unearth the desire for a reciprocal relationship with the natural world. This work has been influential to me as I have begun my spiritual/wilderness awareness process, and I hope the beauty of this book is influential to you too, dear reader.


# **COMIC REVIEW**
